We will only use the information that we collect about you lawfully, in accordance with the Data Protection Act 1998 and the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR).

What data do we collect?

We use Google Analytics to track how our visitors use our website. For visitors of our website, we don't collect any data that could identify you or any personal information.

If you submit a journal article to us, we will process the following data about you:

- Your name
- Your email address
- Details of your education (e.g. university affiliation)

How do we collect your data?

You directly provide Oxford New Books with most of the data we collect. We collect data and process data when you:

- Use or view our website via your browser's cookies
- Submit an article to us
- Sign our publishing agreement (which includes details of your full name)

How will we use your data?

Oxford New Books collects data so that we can:

- Improve our website & user experience
- Communicate with authors about their contributions to the journal

We do not use your data for marketing or any other purposes.

How do we store your data?

All Google Analytics data collected via users visiting our website is securely stored by Google as part of their Google Analytics service.

Oxford New Books stores the data of authors who submit to the journal. This data includes their name, email address, address, and details of their education (e.g. university affiliation). This data is provided by authors to Oxford New Books. This data is stored on the University of Oxford's cloud-based Nexus365 service.

Data is stored in a locked spreadsheet, only accessible by key members of *Oxford New Books*. This data is regularly updated to remove outdated entries, and only key information (email and name) and a copy of the publishing agreement is retained for authors of articles. If you were unsuccessful in publishing with us, we do not retain copies of your article or information about your personal data (for example, your email address).
